Library to Host Library Journal Design Institute in November

Greenville, SC - On **Tuesday, November 9th**, *Library Journal*, in partnership with the South Carolina State Library, will bring the best in new concepts and practices for library architecture and renovation to Greenville through a one-day educational seminar on library building and design. The **Hughes Main Library of the Greenville County Library System** will host the nationally recognized institute bringing together leading architects, librarians and vendors to address building and renovation challenges and opportunities. The Children's Museum of the Upstate, Greenville County Museum of Art, Greenville Little Theater, Museum & Gallery at Heritage Green, and the Upcountry History Museum are also hosting breakout sessions during the event. A guided tour of the Hughes Main Library and Furman University's James B. Duke Library will be offered to participants the day before. The Design Institute expects to draw 100-125 attendees, including architects, design professionals, library directors and other key decision makers from across the country.
